"What have you found to be 'Truth' for you over your years?" the young man asks. Our hero replies, "Well, the past is past, the future is unknown and all we really have is the present". Bill is the best he can be as a "father" to this prospect. Bill ventures to press the encounter, but the young man gets up and leaves. Despite the signs of being close, Bill cannot get an answer. There Bill stands, in the middle of a road in a small mountain town. He looks up each of the merging streets for the lad. Sad, yes, sad. Bill did not personally have much of a past, each road into his future standing before him might take him to a better or worse "somewhere" else. He is left with only that moment. WHY AND HOW OUR CHURCH CAN GROW!

WHY

1. People will, at one time or another in their lifetime, want to experience "Something" that will give them the feeling that life, itself, is meaningful and offers them hope. It is as though there is a "God-shaped" space within them that **must** be filled. So it is a matter of timing.
2. They suspect or hope that "religion" at its best, has something to offer them.
3. Whatever the "Good" or "Spiritual" is, it is generally felt and makes its' appeal as a result of some kind or type of a personal relationship with another person or persons or crisis.
4. This is what Jesus meant when he said that "the field is ripe until the harvest." It is!
5. Why should YOU be interested in having some influence in the life of another? Not just because Jesus said for us to "go into all the world baptizing and teaching" but because you, personally, have gleefully experienced the greatness and goodness of God in your own life. As such, you have the power to share what you, yourself, have experienced of God.

HOW

1. This is where YOU come in. . . as the Holy Spirit works within and through you. . . to have (hopefully!) a good influence on them. You are a kind of evangelist! Most of us are usually a good influence on others more than we are a bad influence or "evangelist" of how God is at work in and through our personal and family life.
2. You can only share what you, yourself, have or know. This is why we stand in worship and in the School of the Church. . . to feed yourself and get what it takes to influence others better.
3. Also, our worship services have to be "user friendly", our members must give a guest the feeling that we genuinely appreciate them being with us and that we hope their needs are met when they come.
4. Preaching must be Biblical, first of all, practical and listenable. The music must be good.
5. Schedule more interesting speakers and advertise this, be prepared for small children and appeal to youth. Have more variety in worship and music.
6. Help keep summer schedules fun, busy and meaningful.
7. Make better use of our Website and Facebook, etc.
8. Pick up and bring others to events that you know will interest them, help others not hurt so much, and offer others help and encouragement.
9. LISTEN TO THOSE AROUND YOU! What are their needs? Design and advertise programs and events that address these needs on a regular basis. Get them into small groups that allow them to feel a part of a group...whether they join officially is not all that important at this point.
10. Have more events that highlight children and youth! This really turns out parents and grandparents who begin to feel that THIS is truly their church home.
11. How can we have more singles or second- marriage folks to feel at home here? How can we better "beef up" our Senior Adult Ministry and who will oversee it systematically?
12. Could our Greeters meet visitors OUTSIDE and walk them in and help them make contact with another member. . .to start a good relationship going?
13. Help us become a great "word-of-mouth" church where we talk the Pastor and programs up.
14. Do we expect enough of each member to keep their eyes and ears open to those who are needing help or hope and actually pick them up and bring them to a service or program? Will they actually CARE AND DARE. . . Care for a neighbor and dare to offer them a ride here as well as friendship and "side door" evangelism?
15. What do YOU think about these suggestions? Add and act on your own.

Oh, we will make mistakes, but this is far, far better than making no mistakes! After all, we members have been BLESSED AND WE ARE TO BE A BLESSING.

God WILL bless us if we . . .each of us. . . live forward in this way!!

Three Kinds of Grace A Heuristic Chart

While writing a sermon on Psalm 103, I was concerned that sometimes we Christians have a deficient view of the role of grace in the Christian life. I showed the following clips from *Saving Private Ryan* to illustrate one deficient view: that grace is something God saves us by, but we must then pay this back by how we live our lives. Most of you know the story: Private Ryan must be saved and sent home (his family has lost all his brothers in the war) and so a squad of Rangers scours the combat zone, some dying in the process, to find him. In the first clip Captain Miller, played by Tom Hanks, is about to die, and whispers his final words to Private Ryan.

The film ends with the clip below, as we see James Ryan return to honor those who gave their lives for him.

I couldn't help feeling sorrowful as the burden of "earning this" was placed on that young man. But the sorrow was personal: I too have struggled for much of my life with earning the grace of God, or being good enough.

For the sermon, I also wrote down the following chart on three ways that Christians can understand (or misunderstand) the place of grace within the Christian life. I advocated for the third understanding (grace as liberation).
