Sometimes Prophets Have a Hard Time

I wonder. I wonder if an Old Testament prophet knew what he might be in for when he dared to "speak the word of the Lord" to the people? Nathan dared to address King David on what he had done by arranging to kill Bathsheba's husband. I wonder what Moses thought when God asked him to speak truth to power before the exodus. He tried to beg off. I wonder what Amos and Hosea and Micah thought when, with fear and trembling, they had to say, "Hear the word of the Lord" to a comfortable Israel who was being asked to change?

Maybe it was the timing or the way it was done or maybe it was the content of the message that had folks riled up. Jesus and Paul also riled folks up from time to time....and they both paid a price for it, too.

I often tell my Session that as long as their **motives are good and their method is fair** we will earnestly and honesty try and respect new ideas they have in mind for the good of our congregation.

Well, recently, someone(s) motives were truly good. They were not out to shock or even rile anyone up. But they were inviting others to think about how we all...all of us...might work even harder and more intentionally at trying to love and show respect to everyone around us. Some call this "consciousness raising". We all agree that this is always a good and necessary thing to try and do, too. Jesus asks us to risk suffering for Him at times. Their goal was worthy, for sure.

Some might agree that it was the method that caused the stir....maybe so. Maybe so. And, so, while we salute them and appreciate their courage for caring and daring to follow the call of Christ, we all might learn something from this effort so we may do an even better job at showing care. In this case, here are a few ways we can "have our cake" of caring and "eat it too" without having to suffer the backwash:

Have a working Christian Education Committee on our Session (CE) vs. the fly by night, "do what you can" way of doing things with our children, youth and adult CE program. In this way, ideas can better be worked out and through for what we hope to get done.

In the case of the recent event, we might say something like, "What a great idea and what a creative way of seeing that what we are after gets across!" In this way, we can appreciate the idea of the caring person who came up with this creative approach and use her way of trying to get us engaged in a ministry of loving and respect in our daily living even better.

We might say, "this is too good an idea for us not to do it at an after church luncheon or family night supper? In that way, we could have a panel of youth and older sharing together at discussing it and.... maybe find ways for all of us to put love and respect into practice even better", etc.

I heard the piece of music offered originally. Actually, it was good and not offensive! It was a creative way of learning and I salute the youth for her care and attempt to bring gifts to our congregation. She and our Lord are providing us ways to grow in Grace and offering us ways both to improve how we manage our C. Ed program and to grow in love and respect for one another at this moment.

2017 Budget & Finances

Over the last 10 years, our income has not met our expenses. SAPC first used the Savings, which is now depleted, to pay the pastor, organist, nursery attendant, grounds keeper, utilities, insurance, committee expenses, etc. We are now using the Capital Fund. The Session needed to stop this drain. Church membership has dropped from 195 to 120 the last 10 years. After much discussion by the Session and the pastor, it was decided we would go from a full time to a part time pastor.

Pastor Jim has reduced his hours in the office at SAPC from 4 days a week to 2. This allowed our expenses to be reduced around \$1,000 a month.

With this reduction in our staff payroll, our monthly deficit can be reduced or eliminated completely! This approach allows us to reduce our deficite, it does not mean we as a church are going to close. We still strive to "Be the Face of Christ in the Community".

We again have a very tight budget for 2017. Even with the salary reduction for the pastor, no salary increases for staff and the utilities, insurance, etc. all increased slightly (nothing goes down, it always go up!), we have an excellent opportunity to not use the Capital Fund in 2017.

Our current income (consisting of your faithful giving, Hope Chest and others) may not be sufficient. We also need funds for our committees to do the mission work needed to keep SAPC a vibrant church in the community.

How are we to keep SAPC from disappearing from the Westside? It is all up to you!

Remember this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully.



What is Advent? Why do we celebrate it; it's not in the Bible?

What Denominations Celebrate Advent?

Advent is primarily observed in <u>Christian churches</u> that follow an ecclesiastical calendar of liturgical seasons to determine feasts, memorials, fasts and holy days:

Catholic

Orthodox

Anglican / Episcopalian

Lutheran

Methodist

Presbyterian

Today, however, more and more <u>Protestant</u> and Evangelical Christians are recognizing the spiritual significance of Advent, and have begun to revive the spirit of the season through serious reflection, joyful expectation, and even through the observance of some of the traditional Advent customs.

Origins of Advent

Advent has probably been observed since the fourth century. Originally, it was a time when converts to Christianity readied themselves for baptism. According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, Advent began sometime after the 4th century as a time of preparation for Epiphany, and not in anticipation of Christmas. Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of Christ by remembering the visit of the wise men and, in some traditions, the Baptism of Jesus. At this time new Christians were baptized and received into the faith, and so the early church instituted a 40-day period of fasting and repentance.

Later, in the 6th century, St. Gregory the Great was the first to associate this season of Advent with the coming of Christ. Originally it was not the coming of the Christ-child that was anticipated, but rather, the Second Coming of Christ.

By the Middle Ages, the church had extended the celebration of Advent to include the coming of Christ through <u>his birth</u> in Bethlehem, his future coming <u>at the end of time</u>, and his presence among us through the promised <u>Holy Spirit</u>. Modern-day Advent services include symbolic customs related to all three of these "advents" of Christ.

Definition of Advent

The word "advent" comes from the Latin "adventus" meaning "arrival" or "coming," particularly of something having great importance.

The Time of Advent

For denominations that celebrate Advent, it marks the beginning of the church year. In Western Christianity, Advent begins on the fourth Sunday prior to <u>Christmas</u> Day, or the Sunday which falls closest to November 30, and lasts through Christmas Eve, or December 24. When Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday, it is the last, or fourth Sunday of Advent.

Christians use the four Sundays and weeks of Advent to prepare and remember the real meaning of Christmas. There are three meanings of 'coming' that Christians describe in Advent. The first, and most thought of, happened about 2000 years ago when Jesus came into the world as a baby to live as a man and die for us.

Advent is a season observed in many Western Christian churches as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas. The term is a version of the Latin word, meaning "coming".

Advent Wreaths

Advent wreaths have their origins in the folk traditions of northern Europe, where in the deep of winter people lit candles on wheel-shaped bundles of evergreen. Both the evergreen and the circular shape

symbolized ongoing life. The candlelight gave comfort at this <u>darkest time of the year</u>, as people looked forward to the longer days of spring.

Later, Eastern European Christians adopted this practice. By the sixteenth century, they were making Advent wreaths much as we know them today. An advent wreath traditionally contains four candles-three purple and one rose. Purple dyes were once so rare and costly that they were associated with royalty. The three purple candles in the Advent wreath symbolize hope, peace, and love. These candles are lit on the first, second, and fourth Sundays of Advent. The rose candle, which symbolizes joy, is usually lit on the third Sunday.

Sometimes a fifth candle is placed inside the Advent wreath. This candle is lit on Christmas Day. It is white, the color associated with angels and the birth of <u>Jesus</u>.

Because Advent wreaths are an informal celebration, not all are the same. Instead of purple candles, some people use blue, which recalls the color of the night sky before daylight returns. Others use all white candles.

Advent Symbols and Customs

Many different variations and interpretations of Advent customs exist today, depending upon the denomination and the type of service being observed. The following symbols and customs provide a general overview only, and do not represent an exhaustive resource for all Christian traditions.

Some Christians choose to incorporate Advent activities into their family holiday traditions, even when their church does not formally recognize a season of Advent. They do this as a way of keeping Christ at the center of their Christmas celebrations.

The wreath, typically a circular garland of evergreen branches, is a symbol of <u>eternity</u> and unending love.

White

White is the color of Advent representing purity and light. Christ is the sinless, spotless, pure Savior. He is the light come into a dark and dying world. Also, those who receive Jesus Christ as Savior are washed of their sins and made whiter than snow.

Spiritually preparing by focusing on the colors of Advent in the weeks leading up to Christmas is a great way for <u>Christian families</u> to <u>keep Christ the center of Christmas</u>, and for parents to teach their children the true meaning of Christmas.

Advent Calendars

An advent calendar is a card or poster with twenty-four small doors, one to be opened each day from December 1 until Christmas Eve. Each door conceals a picture. This popular tradition arose in <u>Germany</u> in the late 1800s and soon spread throughout Europe and North America. Originally, the images in Advent calendars were derived from the Hebrew Bible.

We all know that <u>Christmas</u> officially begins on Christmas Eve, but when does Christmas end? It's complicated. On January 6th, the Feast of the Epiphany (in most places in the U.S. the feast is transferred to the Sunday between January 2 and January 8), the Church celebrates the biblical event where the Magi, also called the Three Wise Men or Three Kings, traveled from the East to pay homage to the newborn King, Jesus Christ. Many believe that this is the date when the Christmas season officially ends, being the end of the 12 days of Christmas.

St. Andrews Youth Program

Recently it was suggested I write a Newsletter article about what I have been doing with the youth. First let me just say that I am so proud of all three of my youth girls in the progress they have made in the last three years in their relationship not only with God, but with themselves. Self-esteem issues are something all teens deal with at some point or another, and all people deal with too. God can help that. Having someone to encourage and recognize the talents that one possesses can help. This is what I have tried to do over the years, and have taught the girls to do for themselves and one another. We have done numerous self-esteem building exercises, read books, done bible study series, went to camp, had overnights, combined with another youth group for more support one day a week, and much more... and I can honestly say that it has all paid off. Each one of the girls has grown spiritually in their walk with God and have also grown to be kind caring young adults who love themselves and others around them. They want to help others and be a light for those in darkness. They have a voice and they want it to be heard. Three years ago they would sit in silence, now they speak up for God and what they believe in no matter what price they pay for it. They still have their moments of doubt and fear and anxiety just like the rest of us, but they are learning how to stand tall in a cruel and unfair world.

As of right now, we are studying Revelations because that is what the girls wanted to do. We are reading a book with questions and journal time and also have a bible study they take home with them weekly. I told them it is a difficult study, and it isn't always encouraging and sometimes it's even scary and dark. Because Revelations is real. It is the realist part of the bible and the truth isn't always easy to hear. The things that happen leading up to Jesus's second return and what happens after is scary and uplifting at the same time. If you have never read or studied Revelations I recommend you do so too, because a lot of what is happening in the world is exactly that in Revelations. The light at the end of the tunnel is that no matter what darkness we face, God is glory in the end, forever and ever.

But with that knowledge still comes a responsibility. God very clearly states that if you are not doing what he has asked of us as an individual or a church we will not be blessed. He clearly states he will destroy everything that is not pure at heart. So this is why we study it. God knows our intentions, and he will judge accordingly. We are learning to make sure that our actions are something that would please God, and that our intentions are pure. Some people may be upset at what I said a few weeks ago, and to be honest I can't understand why anything I said would offend anyone. I am just trying to do God's work, to love everyone and to bring our community into the church to help them, because that is what we are here for, that is what we are called to do. I fall short sometimes, as we all do, but our work as God's people is to do what he would do. And in all we do we need to ask ourselves, am I doing this for him or for myself?

I am doing what I feel God is calling me to do, and teaching the youth how to become responsible, caring and successful adults that love God with all their heart. And I am doing what I have to in order to make that intention a reality. I will be working with the Christian Education Committee in developing guidelines for the St. Andrews youth program. I do my best and try to ask God for guidance when I feel like I have hit bottom ground. I will meet periodically with the Pastor and the Christian Education Committee for guidance and to advise them of what we have been doing. All I am trying to do is to make this world a little brighter because it's full of hatred and darkness, and I want my youth to do the same.

- The chance to be recognized and feel appropriately good about yourself.

- It is good to have fellowship with others....feel a part of great community of people.
- It's fun to have folks hear all about your children and grandchildren, etc.
- It is good to know you are with others who know and care for you.

You know whether or not you like to work alone or with others. You know whether or not you like a one-time project, a short-term project or a long term project. You get to pick and have control over what you are willing to take part in!

This is how your church is respectful and responsive to your life and your desire to be a part and make a great difference somewhere. It is our service to YOU.

Now, to be honest, here is where St. Andrews needs real help now:

- If you want more Thursday night suppers/programs, we need a few good volunteers to pitch in and help make it possible. We train!
- If you see any committee of the Session that needs your strengths or abilities to see that something gets done or done better, step up and say something! Don't wait until you are asked.




SALVATION ARMY
